International Veterinary Students' Association: World Congress Report



International Veterinary Students' Association 2016

The International Veterinary Students' Association (IVSA) is a not-for-profit non-governmental organization run by volunteer students from around the world. They aim to improve the standard of veterinary education internationally in order to "benefit the animals and people of the world".

The 65th Congress of the IVSA was held between July 24th and August 3rd, 2016 in Vienna, Austria. More than 260 students from 37 different countries came together for a full ten days of lectures, workshops, excursions, general assemblies, as well as, cultural and social events.

Thanks to the growing relationship between our organizations, and thanks to an invitation extended by the IVSA, a WCCS representative was sent for the first time to attend this major annual symposium. We would like to thank the IVSA for this opportunity!

It was immensely interesting and inspiring to learn from all these

student leaders, and to exchange experiences and ideas. The main focus of their discussion topics and policy statements ranged from animal welfare, health, and veterinary education to culture and tradition. Global healthcare topics, such as antimicrobial resistance, were also included.

For the students, the major purposes of the event seemed to be opening their minds, expanding their knowledge and broadening their perspective while also making lifelong friends. This might sound a little familiar to you. During this experience I was particularly struck by the realization that the different student healthcare organizations are working in a very similar manner. I also came to realize how developed the IVSA is and saw ideas that will help the WCCS grow and run more smoothly.


The executive board of the IVSA also offered me the opportunity to give a

presentation to educate 260 veterinary students about chiropractic and the WCCS. It was very well received and raised curiosity and awareness from lots of students. It was very rewarding to see the positive response and their hunger for additional information, it fostered a lot of hope for increased inter-professional communication.

The scale of the chiropractic profession has still yet to meet the other healthcare fields, but we are not to be overlooked. We are all one big family of global healthcare, and strengthening our bonds with our fellow family members should be one of our major focuses to help shape a better and healthier world.

The International Pharmaceutical Students' Federation (IPSF) was founded in 1949 by eight national pharmacy student associations in London. Ever since, this organization has grown to represent over 350,000 pharmacy students and recent graduates in over 70 countries worldwide. IPSF is a nongovernmental, non-profit and non-religious organization.

The Federation aims to equip the future pharmacy workforce for a professional life in a local and international setting and increase their involvement in global health. Through collaborative approaches it strives to strengthen the interprofessional commitment to health and combating global health threats.

The IPSF have numerous activities and campaigns throughout the year, with the World Congress at the forefront. The daily schedule of the Congress is divided into a General Assembly. It is here where all the representatives from the different member countries come together to discuss different topics. Educational symposiums and workshops are held throughout the day.

I remember sitting in awe of the WCCS executive board at my first WCCS in 2008. Mexico City, the UNEVE team and Dr. Jaime Pinillos changed my life forever that year.

There we were, the delegation from the Southern California University of Health Sciences (SCUHS), kind of superstar status in the US with the ICA and ACA on campus, totally humbled at the leadership and level of excellence in the room. It was so incredible to see the generations of chiropractic, to see the strength of just a few hundred chiropractors in

a country and the possibilities of a profession not yet acknowledged as 'legal'.

I cannot believe that was almost 10 years ago.


The following year, in New Zealand, the world of vitalistic chiropractic blew our hearts and minds open. I came from a vitalistic practice as a patient, and was then immersed in an 'evidence-based' school in the states; who would have known that a school could exist that simultaneously vibrated with both vitalism and academia.

As a delegation, we decided then that we would throw our hats in the ring, not only to serve the WCCS, but to put our brand of leadership into the WCCS epigenome and into the global world of chiropractic. In Dallas in 2010 the WCCS officially incorporated as a non-profit organization, completed a vision process that birthed our purpose statement and core values, and unanimously adopted definitions for both chiropractic and subluxation.

In 2011 SCUHS hosted the WCCS AGM in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. We did so for one primary reason; the profession in Brazil was under attack. The political agenda of Brazilian medical groups and nearly 100,000 physical therapists was to dissolve and absorb the chiropractic profession.

One highlight of Rio was the beginnings of the Philosophy Night. Our delegation wanted to create this informal time where students could communicate more closely with the leaders in our profession.

We realized that the different factions in the profession, when asked candidly and intimately, actually had more similarities than differences with regards to the philosophy of chiropractic.

I cannot express enough the value of the WCCS. Our world is becoming more and more polarized, we are so fortunate to have an organization that honors our diversity while at the same time honoring the uniqueness of our beautiful profession. other No such organization exists within chiropractic, and from the looks of it seven years into practice, it's not happening soon. The WCCS is one of our most valuable organizations and we are only just getting started.

Many subscribe to the idea that success in practice and in life depends on your philosophy. While for some of us that means honoring Universal Intelligence, Innate Intelligence, and Subluxation, I will repeat now what I said at the AGM in Perth in 2012. The highest values

in human beings are those that bring us together, those that are strong in purpose and vision, and those that are inclusive.

Gratitude and appreciation are hardwired into our neurology. The future of our profession, and humanity at large, are dependent generation upon our chiropractors recognizing this. It has been amazing to see where this new leadership has brought our great organization, with over attendees at WCCS events last year this alumni is sincerely proud of your hard work and dedication.

An update from the Western Pacific Region

The WCCS Western Pacific chapters have been busy since the AGM in Paris 2016.
